Word of God - This week we have been learning how Jesus' first miracles show to us his power as true God and he still uses his power today to provide for our bodily and spiritual needs. Our hymn for the week is, "Jesus, Your Blood and Righteousness"

Reading - What would it be like to immigrate to the US in the early 1900s? We are exploring this and many other concepts through our new novel, "In the Year of the Boar and Jackie Robinson."

Science - This week we are taking a look at hurricanes and tornadoes. How do they form? What can we do to stay safe? How do they affect Earth's air, land, water, and living things?

Social Studies - We are exploring the culture of the first inhabitants of Washington, the coastal and plateau tribes. We are noticing how many of Washington's counties and cities are named after many of the Native American tribes from here in Wash-

ington (pronouncing their names has been fun too).

5th-6th Grade News

The featured class of the week is: Social Studies. With our two-year cycle during 5th and 6th grade, I cover ancient history and early American history. Last year we learned about the ancient Egyptian, Mesopotamian, Indian, Chinese, and Incan civilizations. This year we are covering the ancient Greek, Roman, and Arabian civilizations. Then we will take a jump to the colonial era of US history, finishing with the American Revolution. This is in coordination with the subjects Mr. Biebert is covering in 7th and 8th grades.

I have a few skills I really try to emphasize during social studies. The first is note-taking. I want the students to learn which parts of the text are the most important, and how to figure out which ones to take note of. Another skill I emphasize is supporting opinions with evidence. We do a lot of structured paragraphs and an essay or two to work on that skill regularly. Finally, I alternate my curriculum between a general study from the text and a deep dive into a specific topic. This last unit we followed up our study of ancient Greece by looking at excerpts from four sources to come up with our own opinion about how many Persian soldiers participated in the Battle of Thermopylae. My hope is that focusing on these skills will help get the students ready for later middle school classes, and ultimately high school.



In other classes, we continue to study the beginning of Jesus's ministry and the 2nd Article of the Apostles' Creed in religion. In math, the 6th grade is taking a test on multiplication today before moving on to division concepts next week. The 5th grade math class will have their test on multiplication next week Tuesday. We are building models of ecosystems in science class before going on to learn more about how they work, and in social studies we are going to be starting our study of the ancient Roman civilizations next week. Finally in English class, we are learning about how sentences can be broken down into different parts (subjects, predicates, clauses, phrases, etc...)

A big thank you goes out to our chaperones for our field trip last week: Mr. Van Horne, Mr. Diaz, Mrs. Yancey, Mrs. Phillips, Mrs. Lee, and Mrs. Benson. Thank you for your contributions toward a successful field trip!

Finally, thank you to all the parents who brought their children to sing in church last Sunday. We had about a third of the class there, and it was wonderful to worship with you!

7th-8th Grade News

We had a shortened week due to the church campout, but it ended up being a very productive week at school. We have been going over some very fundamental concepts in math as we have been learning about equation solving, area formulas, and volume formulas. We had a history test this week on some of the overview information about Washington state, and we also learned how to write big boy and girl answers in the way that answer questions. I saw the most beautiful answers in history this week that I shed 2 tears plus 1.

Here is the memory work for next week:

10/2: Ezekiel 18:4, Galatians 3:10; 10/5: Hymn 385: 1,4,5; 10/6: Hebrews 9:27, The First Article of the Apostles' Creed

Not unlike a Rocky IV remake, we will be transitioning into studying the collision of two worlds. No, not Drago vs. Rocky, but we will be studying an East versus West clash as we study how European cultures clashed with the Native cultures of Washington State.

We have had some interesting explorations of bones this last week as we realized how amazing our skeletal structures are, all thanks to our merciful God. God could have given us just hard structures we call bones, but we learned how fragile this would really be as we smashed bones with a hammer this week. We smashed the bones twice....once we smashed fresh bones, and the second time we smashed bones that had no organic material left in them.....they crumbled into dust. We also saw how amazing the collagen that God gave us for our bones is. We melted the inorganic material away in some good old fashioned hydrochloric acid, which left behind only the collagen.....a rubbery goo that gives our bones some flexibility/cushion. Yes, rubbery goo is the scientific way to describe collagen if you were wondering.

Thank you for helping your kids attend church this last Sunday for singing. They sounded absolutely amazing in their praising of God. I heard so many wonderful comments about their singing.

Please don't forget that picture week is already next week. Our class will be having its pictures taken next Tuesday. I am sure it will be a mad dash to scoop up all the Dapper Dan in Spokane, so get it before it's too late.

Also a reminder that we will be leaving early and arriving late next Wednesday for our field trip to Grand Coulee Dam. We plan to leave at 8 am and get back around 4:30 pm.

I hope to see some of you this weekend at the school campout. I am very much looking forward to doing some relaxing and reconnecting with some of you around a campfire this weekend.
